Enjoying a stunning rural location in the Lincolnshire Wolds, this CL was opened by Rob and Jeanette Folwell in 2010. Rob had taken early retirement from the police force in Leicestershire and the couple were locking for a new business venture. Experienced caravanners and members of The Club for more than 15 years, they thought that a CL would make a great addition to the self-catering holiday cottage business they were setting up at their new Lincolnshire home. Keen to make the site as good as possible, they have equipped it with hardstanding pitches (plus one seasonal grass pitch), 16A hook-up points as well as a shower and toilet block (including a laundry room).

# MEET THE OWNERS

# We chat with Rob and Jeanette Folwell



#### Why did you set up the CL?

"Being caravanners, we knew all about CLs and thought that this would be a great addition to the holiday cottage business that we were also creating. Situated in the Lincolnshire Wolds countryside, half way between

Lincoln and the county's coastal resorts, we thought it would be a spot that caravanners would be interested in visiting. Most people think of Lincolnshire as flat and uninteresting, so they are surprised to see the undulating countryside we are surrounded by."

### Describe a typical visitor

"People come from all over the UK and are often fans of wildlife—we are a short drive from several nature reserves, including Donna Nook on the Lincolnshire coast, where you can watch grey seals. This is especially popular in November and December when the seal pups are born. There are also plenty of cycling and walking opportunities in the area, plus people often like to explore the city of Lincoln or coastal resorts such as Sutton-on-Sea."

## What does it take to make a winning CL?

"From the cutset, we decided that we were going to do things right and not skimp on anything. We spent a lot of time planning and developing the site, including new roadways and hardstanding pitches, plus constructing our own washroom and toilet block. This meant a fairly large up-front capital cost, but this was paid off within two years of the site opening, so now we just hawe to pay the on-going running costs to cover electricity and maintenance. We think this is much better than developing a site in several stages, over many years, since there's less disruption and people will be much happier staying on a fully-equipped site."

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
